

ONE OF SIX PATRIOTS.

STEVENAGE PARENTS LOSE TWO SONS.

Mr. and Mrs. George Newberry, of Sish-lane, Stevenage, who have a splendid patriotic record, have learned unofficially that a married son, Private Maurice Newberry, Herts. Regiment, has been killed in action. The news has come through in letters from Stevenage chums, and the family fear that no mistake has been made, as he was expected home on leave at the time and did not arrive, and, in addition, although a regular correspondent to his wife, a letter has not been received from him since.

Private Maurice Newberry was one of six sons, all of whom volunteered when England was in danger. One has already died for his fellows, and another has been wounded for the third time. Four are still serving—one of them in Mesopotamia. One son is a lance-corporal, while another is a sergeant, and the whole of them are of smart and soldierly bearing. Private Maurice Newberry, whose death is now announced, was formerly gardener at Alleyne's Grammar School. His wife and young children were expecting to see him last week-end on leave of absence. Sympathy will be extended to both wife and parents at Stevenage in this severe war loss, and the E.S.A. men, where the father is employed, have extended their sympathy to Mr. Newberry, sen.

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
