



This Oyster card is your ticket to a lifetime love for reading.

You are going to go on a journey using the tube map on the rear of the booklet. Each station represents a different challenge. You must complete each challenge before progressing to the next station. As well as the listed challenge you need to find out information about each author- at what time period did they write, what were their most famous novels etc. You cannot jump stations- you must follow the line, but you can jump to the next one. For example, you can start on the blue line, but change to the red line when you reach Patterson station.

When you have completed each challenge you will receive a stamp for the corresponding station. Each stamp is worth an achievement point. There will be prizes for the number of books read, including a free book for every 5 books read, a £5 WH Smith voucher for 10 books and a £10 WH Smith voucher for 15 books read. The most prolific readers will be entered into a prize draw to win a Kindle Fire every time they read an extra 5 books.

There are a total of 30 stations, which means 30 different challenges.

The stations are:

Orwell - Draw a storyboard of the most important scene in the book.

Doyle - Write a 50 word synopsis for the book you have read.

Pratchett - Create a collage relating to the themes of the book.

Tolstoy - Judge a book by its cover: Look at the cover, write 30 words on what you think it is about. Read the book, what is it actually about? (50 words)

Huxley - Would you recommend this book to a friend? Explain your reasons. (30 words)

Fleming - Rewrite the blurb in your own words.

Dahl - Draw/ design a brand new book cover for the book you have read.

Blyton - Write the diary entry for one of the characters at a crucial point in the book.

Wilson - Write an alternative ending for the book you have read.

Lewis - Write a rap/ poem about one of the characters in the book.

Dickens - Choose a book that depicts life in a past era, for example *Oliver Twist*, produce an extract that is rewritten in modern times.

Chaucer - Create a shortlist of the top 3 books you have read, you must explain what each book is about. Decide which one you consider to be the best and justify your choice.

Attwood - Create a facebook profile for your favourite character.

Ness - Create a timeline of events from the story

Potter - Write a series of three twitter feeds from various points in the story.

Key - What if: how would things be different in the book if the main character was of the opposite gender? (100 words)

Fine - Plan out the sequel to the book you have read.

Swindells - Rewrite a section of the story from the point of view from one of the other characters.

Russell - Draw out a character map showing the main personality features.

Shakespeare - Create an account of day to day life in one of the character's lives.

Priestley - Write an extra from the autobiography of one of the characters.

Rowling - Draw the story arc as a graph, including the tensions that arise.

Tolkien - Plan out the prequel to the book you have read.

Patterson - Write a letter to the author informing them of your views of the book.

Myers - Retell part of the story as a comic strip.

Barrie - Write a brief analysis of one of the characters- why do they act the way they do?

Wells - Write an article about one of the major themes.

Naidoo - Create a leaflet that promotes reading to young people.

King - Rewrite a section of the novel imagining it was set in a different time, i.e. 20 years in the future.

Horowitz - Write a review for the book you have read.
